Nearly all of the animals that we eat are either bipeds or quadrupeds. The bipeds are mostly birds, principally chickens and turkeys. Game birds and more exotic birds are also eaten. In Africa and South America, monkeys form part of what is called jungle meat. Australians are known to eat kangaroos.

Among the quadrupeds, cattle, swine, and sheep predominate in the American diet. Also horse, turtles, alligators, deer, bison, and goats are eaten. It is about goat meat that this article is written.

According to some Wikipedia articles, goat meat is the most widely consumed meat in the world. That may be so, but I have yet to see it in the meat counters of Publix, Winn-Dixie, or Wal-Mart. I did see it, however, in the meat counter of Bravo, a supermarket specializing in a Latin-American clientele.

Although goat can be purchased in all the familiar primary cuts of lamb, *i.e.* leg, loin, or rack, Bravo had cubes only, from Australia. Not having eaten goat before, I purchased a package to try.

As the goat meat was already cut into approximately one-inch cubes with many bones, I was limited in my preparation methods to stew.

Any recipe for lamb will do for goat. Recipes from around the world usually include one or more informing spice, herb, or seasoning such as curry, soy sauce, cinnamon, or cardamom. As I wanted to taste the goat, not the sauce, I used the simplest and plainest stew recipe for my preparation.

Goat meat
Oil, olive, safflower, or any other
Onion, sliced
Garlic, chopped
Bay leaf
Celery
Salt
Stock or water

The amounts of each ingredient I leave to your taste. Brown the goat meat in oil. Remove from the pan and set aside. Brown the onion and garlic in the oil and fat in the pan. Return the goat meat to the pan along with the rest of the ingredients. Cook, covered, over a low heat for at least an hour and a half. Add water or stock as required. Serve with rice or pasta.

How did it taste? Like lamb used to taste. Nowadays, lamb, beef, and other foods have lost their flavors because of over processing, treating and selective growing for transportability. This tasted like lamb used to taste. If you don't like lamb, you won't like goat. If you do like lamb, goat is for you (*at less than half the price*).

The month of March has a plethora of mathematician birthdays. They include the well known Albert Einstein (of 3.14 Pi Day fame.... Of which I wrote an article on last year), as well as the lesser well known same birthday of Waclaw Sierpinski. There is the famous Rene Descartes (3.31, of analytic geometry and more), Jean Joseph Fourier (3.21), and Georg Cantor (3.3, driven mad from his study of calculating infinities). There was the brilliant and persecuted Emmy Noether (3.23, whose mathematics helped Einstein and are used today in a wealth of scientific endeavors) as well as Simon Newcomb (3.12, a brilliant autodidact but somewhat of a curmudgeon). There was also Howard Aiken (3.8, who developed the Mark I-IV calculators and was a retired Naval Officer like me and lived in Florida like me).

However, if we are going to talk about real eccentrics in the month of madness, I would like to consider the Hungarian mathematician, Paul Erdos (*pronounced 'er-dish', according to some Hungarian friends*). He gave meaning to the words 'collaboration' and 'connection'. Not to mention the cartoon image of goofy and disheveled genius.

Paul Erdos was born in Budapest on March 26, 1913. His two siblings died before he was born, and his two parents (*both high school mathematics teachers*) doted on him as the only child. They knew they had a special son when at the age of four, he could calculate in his head how many seconds a person had lived, given their age (*sounds like a computer algorithm a young Mensan would devise today*). He earned a doctorate in mathematics at the age of 21. After receiving a position at Princeton University in 1938, he developed a habit of traveling from one world-wide university campus to another (*as well as friend's house to friend's house.. sometime uninvited*). During his lifetime, he received at least fifteen honorary doctorates and was a member of scientific academies in eight countries. He had a heart attack and died September 20, 1996 at the age of 83, while at a conference in Warsaw. He suggested that his epitaph read: "*I've finally stopped getting dumber*". He never married and had no children. His life was documented in the film, *N Is a Number: A Portrait of Paul Erdos*. I recommend the book, *The Man Who Loved Only Numbers (1998)*, for an interesting and detailed retelling of his life.

Erdos was one of the most prolific publishers of papers on mathematical history, comparable to Leonhard Euler. Erdos wrote around 1,520 mathematical articles in his lifetime, many with collaborators. Because of this, friends created the 'Erdos number' as a tribute. It describes a person's degree of separation from Erdos himself, based on collaboration with him or with another who has their own Erdos number. Erdos was assigned the number '0' for him-

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self, while immediate collaborators could claim an Erdos number of '1', their collaborators would have an Erdos number of '2', and so on. Approximately 200,000 mathematicians have an assigned Erdos number. Due to collaborations with mathematicians, many scientists in fields such as physics, engineering, biology and economics have an Erdos number as well.

His colleague, Alfred Renyi (*ALSO born in March!*) said, "A mathematician is a machine for turning coffee into theorems". Erdos demonstrated that by drinking huge amounts of coffee throughout his life. He consumed copious amounts of amphetamines, despite the concerns expressed by his friends. At one time, he discontinued their use but then resumed their use. He defended his return to the drugs by saying, "Before when I looked at a piece of blank paper, my mind was filled with ideas. Without their use, now all I see is a blank piece of paper."

He had his own idiosyncratic vocabulary. Children were referred to as "epsilons" (*an arbitrarily small positive quantity*), women were "bosses", men were "slaves", people who stopped doing mathematics had "died", people who physically had died had "left", music except for classical style was "noise", people married were "captured" and divorced were "liberated". Although an atheist, he spoke of "*The Book*", an imaginary book in which God had written down the best and most elegant proofs for mathematical theorems. He once said, "You don't have to believe in God, but you should believe in *The Book*". (*I am not sure how one could do that mental gymnastic*). He often accused God of hiding his socks and Hungarian passports, and of keeping the most elegant mathematical proofs to himself (*How you do that if you are an atheist I do not know. I guess he was a mathematician, not a logician*).

Most of the belongings of Erdos would fit into two suitcases, which was helpful as most of his life was spent as a vagabond that travelled between conferences and homes of colleagues all over the world. He would show up at someone's doorstep and announce, "My brain is open", meaning he was ready to pursue mathematics. He would stay long enough to collaborate on a few papers before moving on a few days later. Usually, asking his current collaborator about whom he should next visit.

The stories by friends of Erdos and his strange and quirky life are numerous. They would fill a book by themselves and still there would be more to discover. He often had some interesting responses to questions put to him about his baffling behavior and inability to perform the simplest tasks in life. "I can make excellent cold cereal, and I can probably boil an egg, but I've never tried."

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Committee have renewed our commitment to bringing the Mensa community together but due to the geography of our county it is difficult to find a location easily accessible to everyone. He would speak about numbers as the only true existence and muse about the perfect death. He thought the perfect death should occur in a lecture, when he had just finished presenting a proof and a cantankerous member of the audience would raise his hand to ask, "What about the general case?" In response, Erdos would reply, "I think I'll leave that to the next generation, " and fall over dead.

On his '*March to the Music of the Spheres*', no one has yet come around to being quite so prolific a mathematician and quite so zany in his personal life.

I attended the Central Florida Mensa “It’s All Sun ‘n’ Games” RG over Martin Luther King Jr. Day weekend, and it was one of the best, if not the best, regional gatherings I’ve been to in Florida over the past ten years. Kudos to Debbie Freeland, David Fleming, and all their team for putting together a great event. They’re already working on next year’s RG, which will be held at the same great hotel near SeaWorld. In the meantime, many of the Tampa Bay Mensa RG team were inspired by Central Florida’s gathering, and are working to assemble an equally fine event for “MaRGaritaville” over Memorial Day weekend. Gatherings are one of the most obvious social aspects of Mensa. There are in fact many social opportunities in Mensa, depending on your local group. But while many long-time members consider social events the most important mission of Mensa, this seems to be less and less of a value for many of our members. As social media takes on more emphasis, a smaller percentage of our membership participate in the face-to-face events posted in the local group calendars and social media.

Is Mensa primarily a social club anymore?

Consider: The Constitution of Mensa has, since 1982, listed three main purposes.

1. Identify and foster human intelligence for the benefit of humanity.
2. Encourage research in the nature, characteristics and uses of intelligence.
3. Provide a stimulating intellectual and social environment for members.

Social interaction is the third item, not the first or second. It seems as though we spend more time addressing this than the first two, and yet a 20% member participation level is considered wildly successful.

I acknowledge that my purpose in joining Mensa back in 1989 was to join a social community after I’d moved to a new city where I didn’t know anyone, and I knew I could belong here in Mensa. And I still feel that way. Participating in, or even just listening in on the sidelines to the sorts of free-wheeling conversations I find during Gatherings are some of the high points of my year. But what about the other 80% of you? What do you get out of Mensa? What do you find valuable enough to renew, some of you for decades, even when you don’t come to events?
