Ah, the perfect cup of coffee! We can all dream of that. But of what does it consist? Before we get into the aesthetics, we need to cover the basics.

The final cup of coffee is the result of several factors, primary among them are the bean, the growing area, the conditions of growth, the blending, the roasting, the grinding, the flavoring, the brewing, and the serving.

Little is known about the origins of coffee as an edible. Our word, coffee, comes from the Turkish *kavəh* which in turn comes from the Arabic *qahwah* which, some say, originally meant "wine".

There is some logic to this supposition as Muslims are not allowed to drink wine and coffee may be the most intoxicating drink permitted.

"Coffee" is one of those universal words. From the original Arabic it has become *café* in French, Portuguese, and Spanish, *Kaffee* in German, *koffie* in Dutch, *caffè* in Italian, *kaffès* in Greek, *kofeh* in Hebrew, *kohii* in Japanese, and *kafei* in Chinese. "Coffee" will get you a cup of Joe almost anywhere.

Coffee probably originated in what is present day Ethiopia. The coffee bush, *Coffea arabica*, grows wild there. Two other species of coffee, *C. robusta*, which originated in the Congo and *C. liberica*, which originated in Liberia are also grown commercially. There are several other coffee species which are not important commercially. Coffee is now grown in a world wide band between the Tropic of Capricorn and the Tropic of Cancer.

C. arabica is the most expensive, and to most people, the best and most preferred. *C. robusta* beans have about twice as much caffeine as *C. arabica* beans, thus most decaffeinated coffees are made of *C. robusta*. The manufacturers of decaffeinated coffees get a double benefit by using *C. robusta*, the beans are less costly and they have more caffeine to sell to the cola companies.

C. liberica has the largest bean but is little used. *C. Arabica* grows best at altitudes above 2000 feet. *C. robusta* and *C. liberica* do best at the lower altitudes.

Because of the price difference, most of the coffee sold is *C. robusta* either by itself or blended with *C. arabica*. If the coffee you buy is pure *C. arabica* it is almost certain to say so on the package.

There are legends that local goatherds noticed that their goats became frisky when browsing among the coffee bushes. From there coffee went to the local monks who chewed on the beans to keep them awake for the mid-night prayers and to dervishes who used it to help in their whirling devotions.

From Harrar in Ethiopia, where it was first cultivated, coffee traveled across the Red Sea to Yemen and from Yemen to Arabia and the rest of the world. Mocha was once a major seaport in Yemen. Coffee distributed from there acquired the name of the port which became the designation of coffee sent from there. Java is a land that grows much coffee and designates coffee sourced from there. W. C. Fields, in several of his films, would order Mocha-Java as his coffee. It was a popular and expensive blend at the time. As is said, the rest is history.

History does tell us that the first coffee houses opened in Constantinople in 1554. From there the use of coffee spread to the rest of western world. Coffee houses opened in Italy in 1580, Persia in 1620, Oxford in 1650, Marseilles in 1671, Paris in 1672, and Vienna in 1683. The Paris café, *Pocope*, opened in 1686.
